The groundwater approach and metaphor from the Racial Equity Institute is based on three observations: 1) racial inequity looks the same across systems, 2) socio-economic difference does not explain the racial inequity; and 3) inequities are caused by systems.

The <u>2021 Public Health Workforce Interests and Needs</u> <u>Survey</u> was conducted by the de Beaumont Foundation and the Association of State and Territorial Health Officials and is the only nationally representative survey of state and local government public health employees in the U.S.
