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


Living Cities' Commitment

We are committed to our vision of a united, multi-sector movement for racial equity, while recognizing the ongoing importance of physical distancing and grieving the losses of life our society is facing.



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






The city has supported civil rights and social justice initiatives including:

- Public Accommodations Ordinance providing equal enjoyment and privileges to public accommodations.
- Fair Housing Practices Ordinance making discrimination in housing illegal.
- Establishing the Minority & Women-Owned Business Enterprise Office.
- Partnering with Charleston County School District and education-focused organizations and programs to improve the quality of education in our schools.
- Supporting efforts of religious institutions including the community of the Mother Emanuel AME church following the tragedy of June 2015.
- The Charleston Illumination Project as a response to the murders at Mother
 Emanuel AME Church to shine a light on the need to improve relationships between citizens and police.
- City of Charleston Police Audit to allow the Charleston Police Department to hire an
 external company to examine CPD's policies and procedures in several areas.
- Slavery Apology Resolution of 2018 to apologize for the City of Charleston's role in regulating, supporting, and fostering the institution of slavery. Also, an expression of gratitude for the significant contributions made to our community by talented and skilled African Americans.
- Created the city's Equity, Inclusion, and Racial Conciliation office.

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The Equity Commission

- City's Equity, Inclusion, and Racial Conciliation Manager; city staff; councilmembers. The Equity Commission was charged with making the City's Apology for Slavery a commitment to revealing and dismantling systemic racism through policy-level change.
- 90 days to map out a vision of achieving racial equity in the community with the mission of eliminating institutionalized racism in the city.

- As elected officials, the election cycle challenge, and fears of how they vote on this social issue of race.



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
