The Community Resilience & Response Task Force collaborated with Resilient Wisconsin and Healthy Wisconsin to integrate concepts of community resilience, equity, and mental health across the state's COVID-19 pandemic response, and set the stage for just recovery and future emergency preparedness infrastructure.

Louisville's 2017 Health Equity Report examines the city's history, and is designed as a tool for policy makers and residents to better understand how they can create more equitable policies and practices.

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## Mobilizing Action Toward Community Health (MATCH) Resources

- Learn more about MATCH and their work.
- The <u>Wisconsin Healthiest State Initiative</u> represents a collective effort to advance health equity in Wisconsin. The initiative consists of convening statewide partners, setting shared priorities around health equity, leading workgroups to make progress on shared priorities, and hosting statewide Summits.
- The <u>Community Resilience & Response Task Force</u> collaborated with Resilient Wisconsin and Healthy Wisconsin (Department of Health Services) to integrate concepts of community resilience, equity, and mental health across the state COVID-19 pandemic response, and set the stage for just recovery and future emergency preparedness infrastructure. A key objective was to strengthen individual and community resilience of groups that are vulnerable to disproportionate harm by the pandemic and the response.
- The University of Wisconsin Population Health Institute developed <u>COVID-19 messaging documents</u> and talking points for multiple languages and cultures.
- The <u>Racism Declaration Action Toolkit</u> includes resources that can support organizational action to advance racial equity.

#### University of Wisconsin Public Health Institute

- The <u>Developing a Transformational Criminal Justice Narrative Toolkit</u> is a resource from Human Impact Partners that is intended to support community organizers and health equity advocates in developing, using, and adapting transformational narratives to advance equity in the criminal justice and juvenile justice systems. This resource was developed by a workgroup of the National Criminal Justice and Public Health Alliance.
- <u>A Narrative of Rural Abundance</u> is a case study about how Land Stewardship Project utilized narrative strategy to be more intentional about how it built power.
- In the fall of 2017, Public Health Awakened members formed the Taxes Narrative Workgroup to start the long-term process of shifting the dominant public narrative about taxes in the US. Their <a href="Transforming the Narrative on Taxes">Transforming the Narrative on Taxes</a> webpage includes highlights about their efforts, as well as tips and tools.

#### Center for Health Equity Louisville Metro Department of Public Health and Wellness

- In June 2006, Louisville Metro Department of Public Health and Wellness established the <u>Center for Health Equity</u> (CHE) which was the first of its kind within a municipal government. CHE was created to advocate for a Louisville Metro where everyone has a fair and just opportunity to be healthy and reach their full human potential. CHE prioritizes polices, partnerships, and performance to advance health equity.
- <u>Louisville's 2017 Health Equity Report</u> is designed as a tool for policy makers and residents to better
  understand how they can create more equitable policies and practices, and it examines the history
  of Louisville and how the past has influenced the present. The report reviews 21 health outcomes

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and examines 11 root causes for those outcomes, ranging from food systems to neighborhood development. Evidence-based practices assembled from comprehensive research programs which have evaluated many policies and programs are also included in the report.

#### Peer-to-Peer Resources Shared in Post-Webinar Discussion Group Session

- <u>Community Organizing: People Power from the Grassroots</u> is a tool from the Center for Community Change that discusses the principles, rules, and strategies of community organizing.
- The <u>PHRASES Framing and Messaging Toolkit</u> from Public Health Reaching Across Sectors provides evidence-based tools and strategies to help public health professionals communicate across sectors.
- The <u>Overton Window</u> is the range of policies politically acceptable to the mainstream population at a given time. The term is named after American policy analyst Joseph P. Overton, who stated that the window frames the range of policies that a politician can recommend without appearing too extreme to gain or keep public office given the climate of public opinion at that time.
- In <u>Dog Whistle Politics: How Coded Racial Appeals Have Reinvented Racism and Wrecked the Middle Class</u>, author Ian Haney López offers an account of how politicians and plutocrats deploy veiled racial appeals to persuade white voters to support policies that favor the extremely rich yet threaten their own interests.
- The Politics of Resentment: Rural Consciousness in Wisconsin and the Rise of Scott Walker is a book written by political science professor, Katherine J. Cramer, who spent years carefully listening to 'ordinary' people talking about politics and power, then used their words to produce a portrait of the mind and heart of contemporary populism.
- The Sum of Us: What Racism Costs Everyone and How We Can Prosper Together is a book by Heather McGhee that has been touted by the New York Times "One of today's most insightful and influential thinkers offers a powerful exploration of inequality and the lesson that generations of Americans have failed to learn: Racism has a cost for everyone—not just for people of color."
